Living in a kampong with seven other girls for a month, friendly competition, table manners and skills in our 35+ activities offered each summer help to develop our campers into fine Waldemar Girls. We will be featuring exceptional former campers in our upcoming Round Up Newsletters. We have so many ladies to showcase! Current campers, we hope this will inspire you to do great things someday, too!

Our first feature alum is Cannon (Lewis) McClintock. Cannon was a First Term Comanche from 1992-1999 and Ideal Waldemar Girl of 1999. She was also a Short Term and First Term counselor. Cannon is now a wife, mother of three girls, and a jewelry designer running her own business in Dallas. We chose Cannon because she learned her trade of jewelry designing at Waldemar!



Cannon says, *“I remember as a junior in Happy Haven waiting for the day I could take Metal and Jewelry. When that jewelry day came, I was immediately hooked. I loved learning how to use the jewelry tools to bezel set stones and cut and solder the metal - I could have spent all day in that craft room. When I started my jewelry line at the end of high school, this foundational knowledge of jewelry fabrication helped me know how to communicate with other jewelers when it came to how I wanted pieces made. I love to incorporate tiny details and nature inspired textures in the jewelry and I’ve even found myself back at the bench over the years with the tools trying to get a certain finish on the piece perfected.”*

“What makes Waldemar so unique are all the intentional layers of leadership opportunities. From actual tribal leadership, to big sisters, to being assigned jobs at camp (my favorites were the mail room and working in the office), and all the specific cabin jobs in between, there was a consistent message at camp that your life is not just about you, but your unique contribution to a larger group. Waldemar taught me everything I need to know about cleaning. I still fold my towels the Waldemar way, I look for dust on ledges, and I know how to make a straight bed. I learned to live with 6 other girls with one bathroom and a scorpion or two (because they always come in pairs). I learned to love nature and to clean up after nourishment - and I still find myself picking up trash at picnic places to this day.

I learned that deep friendship comes not just from the fun experiences but from the times of disagreement where you are stuck still living with that person and it is in learning how to reconcile that the long term friendship becomes rooted.

I learned the sheer joy of being a part of a winning tribe and contributing to that win. I more importantly learned to fail and to fail publicly, whether it was losing an event for my tribe, or leaving my trunk out for inspection giving my whole cabin a minus. I learned that failure and winning are both parts of life, and I could survive failure and be ok.

Waldemar was an incredible gift in those formidable years of my life where I began camp as a young girl and left as a young woman; I am sincerely grateful for all the life lessons and friendships that I carry with me to this day.” -Cannon



Hanging in the Waldemar kitchen is a portrait of Lucille Bishop Smith and her husband, Ulysses S. Smith. They are dressed in their pristine professional culinary attire and are surrounded by beautifully prepared food. I love having their portrait in the kitchen as it inspires me daily of the mission that Lucille Smith, recognized as one of the 100 Most Influential Women in the History of Texas, contributed in the traditions of Camp Waldemar, reigning with excellence from 1928 until 1973.

I love knowing that I have been able to continue the cherished traditions of Waldemar dining excellence: of preparing exquisite menus centered around classics such as Beef Tenderloin and Steelhead Trout, exciting “new” foods such as Colcannon and Phad Thai, as well as beloved favorites such as King Ranch Chicken and Mac ‘n Cheese. The desserts are always fun and nearly impossible to pass on. I’ve always

thought the first thing you eat and the last thing you eat will be the most memorable at any meal. On the next page you will find the recipe for the Mocha Pot de Crème, usually served with fresh whipped cream and assorted berries. It is far and away one of my favorite desserts, a new addition to Camp traditions. I hope you will make it for your family and delight in the gratitude that comes from offering something delicious and beautiful!

Recipe



Ingredients for Mocha Pot de Crème (adapted from Cook's Illustrated Cookbook, 2011**)

Serves 8

This is the best version of chocolate pudding you will ever encounter. It is the sophisticated version, the one that you can serve at holiday time, or Sunday lunch or as the whim strikes, like next Tuesday night dressed in your favorite costume, because it is Pot de Crème night! It is best made the day before service so it has ample time to set. Serve chilled with berries and a dollop of soft whipped cream.

- *10 oz semisweet (60%) or bittersweet chocolate (70%+) discs or finely chopped
- 5 large egg yolks, room temperature
- 5 Tbsp sugar
- ¼ tsp salt
- 1 ½ cups heavy cream
- ¾ cup half and half
- 1 Tbsp espresso coffee, decaf (you can substitute with another liqueur or double the vanilla)
- 1 Tbsp vanilla

*Note: We use the 60% at Camp, which is sweeter but I prefer the slightly more bittersweet flavor of 70% or you can split the difference!

Method:

1. Place chocolate in a large bowl and place a fine mesh strainer over it.
2. Whisk the egg yolks, sugar and salt in a medium bowl until well combined.
3. Add heavy cream and half and half and stir until it is smooth.
4. Transfer to a heavy bottomed pan and heat until it registers 180 F. Do not overcook!
5. Pour custard through strainer into chocolate to remove any curds. Let sit about 10 minutes, stirring occasionally to let chocolate melt.
6. Add the espresso and vanilla and gently stir to blend well.
7. Pour about ½ cup into each individual 5-ounce ceramic ramekins or coffee cup or a quart sized serving bowl. Gently tap on the counter so the bubbles are released. Let mixture cool to room temperature and then put in fridge until set, at least 4 hours or overnight.
8. Serve with fresh whipped cream and berries.
9. Will keep up to 3 days in the refrigerator.

A special note:

I have had numerous parents comment that their campers swear that the food they prepare just doesn't taste as good as it does at Camp. Camp food is more than just the proper combination of ingredients. It is the intangible experience of a special memory imbued in the entire meal. Like being on vacation or celebrating a special event. Create your own special moments at the table. It's not Camp, but it will certainly be delicious!

From the Horse's Mouth

Greetings from the Waldemar Barn! I think the horses were happy to have camp this summer. I know Catherine and I were! It was fun meeting all the new campers and great to see the faces of the returning riders. It sure felt good getting back into the camp routine.

This summer we implemented some of the teaching exercises that we used in 2020 with the Hilltoppers. We primarily taught the girls how to supple their horses and move off their legs. The first term Reeves Riders could not get enough of the new drills and it sure paid off. Quadrille first term was one of the best in memory and every rider was able to get their horse on their correct lead and stay balanced. It was amazing!



Along with the highs of the summer, we sadly saw the passing of two of our most treasured camp horses. RideAway (Top Left), whom we bought in 1999 in Acuña, Mexico as a 2-yr old and Sergeant, who I found in 1994 as a 6 year old. RideAway was a safe mount for all campers, whether they were a Junior, Intermediate or Senior. He was a star polocrosse horse, was the Stake Race horse in Field Day, won many classes in the Horse Show and was a solid mount in Quadrille. He was wonderful at helping his riders feel confident and find their balance and rhythm at a canter. 2nd Term Hilltopper, Lillian Buchanan, was having trouble keeping the horses she rode in a steady canter. Her confidence rose dramatically after her ride on RideAway. Sergeant (Bottom Left), who was 33, was still teaching first year riders in a class or two a day. He was also an all around horse who never put a foot out of place. I cannot tell you how many young riders he set on the road to being confident riders. We tried to impart a couple of important lessons to the campers this summer. The first of which is to listen with your eyes as well as your ears. It is not only what you hear, but what you see that should help you make decisions to keep yourself safe.

This is especially important when working around horses.

The second is for the campers who ride to feel very confident in their leadership abilities. A rider and her horse are a partnership and the horse is looking for the leader. It is an incredible accomplishment for an 80-90 pound girl to take control of an 800-900 pound horse successfully. Sergeant was amazing at teaching that confidence to a novice rider. If she wasn't ready to be the leader, he would quietly stay in line and do exactly what he knew he was supposed to do. As soon as his rider was ready to take control, he gave it freely. He was such an amazing gentle teacher. This strength and confidence transfers to leadership skills in human relationships as well. Horses are the best life skill teachers!

I wish a wonderful beginning of school and joyful holidays filled with family.
